Competence Network Stroke & the Center for Stroke Research Berlin

March 6th – March 7th, 2015 in Berlin

Dear Friends and Colleagues,

We invite you to the 6th International Stroke Symposium in Berlin. This event will be taking place on March 6th and 7th 2015, and is being organized by the Competence Network Stroke together with the Center for Stroke Research Berlin.

Many areas in biomedicine are struggling to bridge the gap between preclinical and clinical research. Only a very small fraction of the so called ‚breakthroughs‘ in our pathophysiological understanding actually lead to improvements in the outcome of patients (‚translational roadblock‘). Stroke research appears to be particularly hard hit, with hundreds of promising drug candidates which appear to work in models of the disease, but fail in large clinical trials. In the session *What’s wrong with stroke research?* we will explore underlying causes, and focus on preclinical research (Ulrich Dirnagl), brain imaging as the epitome of translational tools (Arno Villringer), and clinical trials (Kennedy Lees).

Furthermore World leading experts will give an update on much-discussed topics in stroke research. There is considerable hope that biomarkers will facilitate diagnosis and provide prognostic input. In the session *Never ending breakthroughs* Joan Montaner will inform us whether there will be a „troponin-equivalent“ for stroke. Kári Stefánsson, the initiator of the world’s first population-wide genomic biobank, will give insights on the genetic susceptibility to stroke and other common diseases such as myocardial infarction, atrial fibrillation, and type-2 diabetes. Lastly, Sean Savitz will give an update on the never-ending breakthrough of stem-cell therapy in stroke.

While most stroke research focuses on events in the brain, it is important to emphasize that stroke is not a disorder of the brain only, but it involves the entire body. This is evident in the development of stroke, in the acute phase, as well as in the recovery period. In the session *Brain-body interaction in stroke*, talks will address the role of the autonomous



nervous system, body weight, the cardio-vascular system and immunological factors in all phases of stroke. Interestingly, all these factors mutually influence each other, hence, a complex web of pathophysiological interactions awaits to be understood.

In the Academy for Continued Education the main themes of the Symposium will be taken up in discussion with our colleagues in practices and clinics, so that new scientific insights can become useful in everyday practice. We are delighted that the world’s leading stroke experts have responded positively to our invitation. A further highlight is the evening lecture by Christian Büchel from the Department for Systems Neuroscience at the University Medical Center Hamburg-Eppendorf. He investigates the neuronal basis of placebo and nocebo effects.

The entire event has been certified by the Berlin Chamber of Physicians with 16 CME points. The meeting will take place in the historic walls of the Kaiserin Friedrich-Haus on Robert-Koch Platz and thus in immediate vicinity of the Charité. We would like to thank the sponsors who have helped us to make this symposium possible. We hope the days you spend with us in Berlin will be eventful and inspiring.
